THE ARK IS BROUGHT TO JERUSALEM

2 Samuel 2:1 — 6:23; 1 Chronicles 11:1 — 16:43

The first king of Israel—King Saul—was dead! Who would be the next king? After Saul and some of his sons were killed in battle, the captain of Saul's army (Abner) made Ishbosheth (*ish-BOH-sheth*) king "over all Israel." However, this was not God's will. Many years earlier, God had told the Prophet Samuel to anoint a young shepherd to be the second king of Israel. That young man's name was David.

After David had mourned the death of King Saul and his sons, he asked God where he should go. God told David to go to Hebron where he was made king over the tribe of Judah. "David waxed stronger and stronger, and the house of Saul waxed weaker and weaker."

After a battle loss at Gibeon and a false accusation from Ishbosheth, Abner left Ishbosheth and joined David. Ishbosheth "had two men that were captains of bands." Pretending to need wheat, the two captains came into Ishbosheth's house and found him taking a nap. They murdered him and then hurried to tell David what they had done. They were sure this would please David.

When the captains told David what they had done, he told them of the servant who had brought the news of Saul's death. That servant thought he would receive a reward when he said he had killed King Saul. He was wrong! David told them that the servant was put to death.

Then David said to the captains, "How much more, when wicked men have slain a righteous person in his own house upon his bed?" These two men were also put to death for their wicked deed.

After the death of Ishbosheth, David was anointed "king over Israel." He was 30 years old. David moved to Jerusalem and built his palace on Mount Zion, a mountain inside Jerusalem. David called this place "the city of David."

Soon the Philistines heard David was the king of Israel. They wanted to fight David and the Israelites. When David heard they were coming, he talked to God about it. God promised victory over the Philistines.

David and his men fought and won the battle, as God had said. The Philistines fled so quickly that they left their idols behind. David and his men found the idols and destroyed them. But the Philistines came back. Again, David asked the Lord what to do.

This time, God told David not to go out and meet the enemy. David and his men were to come behind the

Philistines and wait under the "mulberry trees." When they heard a sound of marching in the tops of the trees, it would be a sign that God was going to "smite the host of the Philistines." David did as God said, and a great victory was won that day!

David was truly the king of Israel. All Israel knew it, and Israel's enemies knew it too! David wanted to bring the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem. It had been in the house of Abinadab (*uh-BIN-uh-dab*) since its return from the Philistines (about seventy years earlier).

The Ark was placed on a new cart, and Abinadab's sons—Uzzah

(*UHZ-zuh*) and Ahio (*a-HIGH-o*)—drove the cart. King David and the people played instruments and sang as the Ark traveled to Jerusalem. As they journeyed, the Ark slipped when "the oxen stumbled." Uzzah reached out his hand to the Ark and took hold of it. Immediately, he "died by the ark of God."

What had been a joyous time was now very sad. Why did Uzzah die? Wasn't he trying to do something good? Even King David "was afraid of the LORD that day." David left the Ark with a man named Obededom (*oh-bed-EE-duhm*) for three months.

Although Uzzah might have meant well, he acted in disobedience to the Lord. God had made it very



clear that the Ark was to be carried on the shoulders of the Levites (not on a cart). The Ark was to be covered. God also warned, "They shall not touch any holy thing, lest they die." (Read Exodus 37:5; Numbers 4:5-6, 15.)

In clear disobedience to God's law, the Ark was placed on a cart, as the Philistines had done many years before. When David prayed and talked to God, he realized what he had done wrong.

After a few months, David heard how God was blessing Obededom and his household because of the Ark. David decided to bring the Ark to Jerusalem, but this time, he carefully obeyed God's law. "The children of the Levites bare the ark of God upon their shoulders with the staves thereon, as Moses commanded according to the word of the LORD." Again, David and the people sang, played instruments, shouted, and rejoiced! The Ark was brought to the place David had prepared, and sacrifices were offered before the Lord.

"Then David returned to bless his household." David must have expected his family to feel the great joy that he felt! His wife, Michal, came out to meet David. She had seen David's rejoicing, "and she despised him in her heart." She spoke harshly to David, for she felt he had not acted as a king should act.

David would not let what his wife thought of him change his rejoicing "before the LORD." But God heard what Michal said, and He punished her. "Therefore Michal the daughter of Saul had no child unto the day of her death."

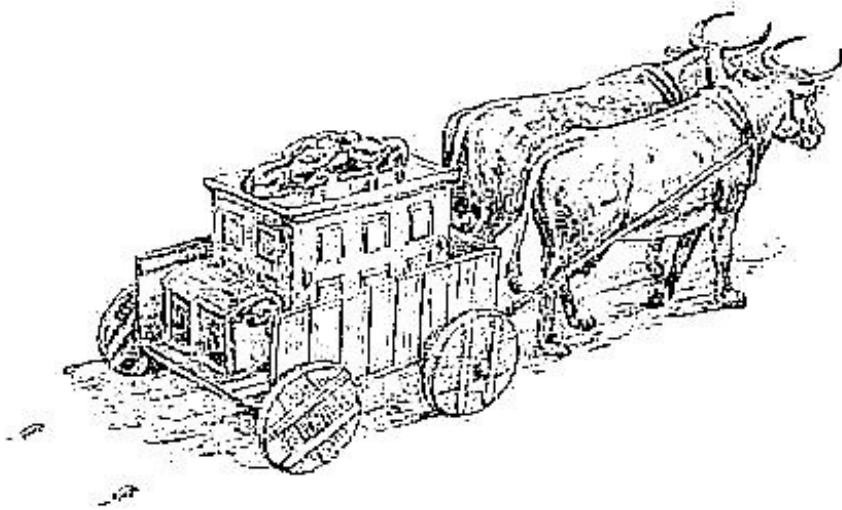

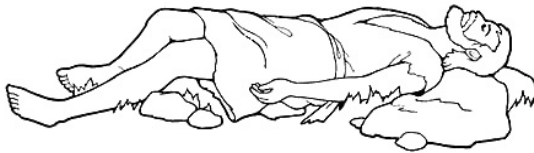
