ELIJAH AND THE CHARIOT OF FIRE

1 Kings 19:16-21; 2 Kings 2:1-18



Prophet Elijah had been told by God to find a man named Elisha, the son of Shaphat (*SHAY-fat*). God said he was to be God's prophet after Elijah. When Elijah found Elisha, he was in a field, plowing with twelve yoke of oxen. Elijah walked by Elisha and threw his mantle, or cloak, on Elisha's shoulders. Elisha, understanding what that meant, left the oxen and ran to Elijah. (A prophet's cloak was a symbol of a call from God.)

Elisha said to Elijah, "Let me, I pray thee, kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow thee." Elisha went back home long enough to tell his family and friends goodbye, then he went with Elijah.

Elisha learned from Elijah how to be a good prophet of the Lord. Elisha did much to help Elijah too, for Elijah was getting old. Elisha loved Elijah.

After several years had passed, the time came for Elijah to leave this world. Elijah and Elisha were in Gilgal. God told Elijah to go to Bethel, to visit a school for young prophets. He may have told them goodbye too. When Elijah got ready to leave Gilgal, he told Elisha to stay there, but Elisha would not leave Elijah. So both Elijah and Elisha went to Bethel.

The young men, who were learning to be prophets of the Lord, said to Elisha, "Knowest thou that the

LORD will take away thy master from thy head to day?"

Elisha said, "Yea, I know it; hold ye your peace." In other words, "Do not say anymore about it; do not remind me." This would be a sad parting for Elisha!

After they had visited Bethel, the Lord told Elijah to go to Jericho. Elijah

told Elisha to stay at Bethel, but again, Elisha would not stay behind. At Jericho, there was another school for the sons of the prophets. Those men, too, told Elisha that God was going to take Elijah away from him that day. But again Elisha said, "Yea, I know it; hold ye your peace."

Then Elijah told Elisha that God wanted him to go to Jordan and that he should stay at Jericho. But Elisha would not hear of it! He wanted to go with Elijah! He stated plainly: "As the LORD liveth, and as thy soul liveth, I will not leave thee." Elisha did not want Elijah to be out of his sight! They both traveled on. Fifty sons of the prophets followed them from a distance, to see what would happen to Prophet Elijah.

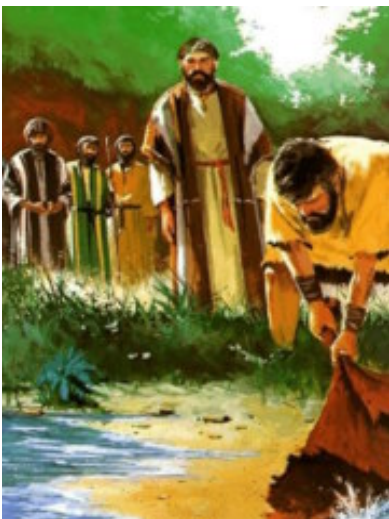
When Elijah and Elisha reached the Jordan River, they stopped. Elijah took his mantle, wrapped it up, and struck the water with it. The waters separated, as the waters in the Red Sea had separated for Moses. Elijah and Elisha walked into the river on dry ground and crossed to the other side!

As they walked along, on the opposite side of the river, the young prophets soon lost sight of them. Elijah said to Elisha, "Ask what I shall do for thee, before I be taken away from thee."

Elisha turned to Elijah and said, "I pray thee, let a double portion of thy spirit be upon me."

Elijah, knowing that only God could fulfill Elisha's request, replied, "Thou hast asked a hard thing." But Elijah promised Elisha, "If thou see me when I am taken from thee; it shall be so unto thee, but if not, it shall not be so."

Elijah and Elisha continued to walk on



and talk. Suddenly, there appeared a chariot and horses. They came right between Elijah and Elisha, separating the two men. This was no ordinary chariot. It was a chariot of fire with horses of fire! What a sight that must have been!

Did Elisha see the chariot? Elisha may have thought that some distraction might occur at the time Elijah was taken. No doubt, he had been preparing himself for it. Therefore, he kept his eyes fixed on Elijah. He kept watching him all the time, no matter what else might happen. He remembered what Elijah had said about seeing him leave and receiving the double portion of his spirit. Elisha wanted a double portion of Elijah's spirit. That was his goal.

As Elisha was watching, a great whirlwind caught up Elijah and carried him out of Elisha's sight. Elijah was taken to Heaven in that whirlwind, and Elisha got to see it happen!

Elisha cried, "My father, my father, the chariot of Israel, and the horsemen thereof." But Elijah was gone! To show his sorrow of heart, Elisha took hold of his clothes and tore them in two pieces. But Elisha did not stop to mourn. He saw the mantle of Elijah lying on the ground, where it had fallen from Elijah. Elisha picked it up; then he went back to the river Jordan.

Elisha took the mantle and struck the waters,

saying at the same time, "Where is the LORD God of Elijah?" God answered Elisha by parting the waters, just as He had done for Elijah. Elisha walked over on dry ground!

When the sons of the prophets saw Elisha, they said, "The spirit of Elijah doth rest on Elisha." They came up to him and bowed, showing their respect to him as they had to Elijah. Elisha was the new master or teacher to the young prophets.

The prophets asked Elisha to send some men to look for Elijah's body. They thought, maybe, the Holy Spirit had left his body on some mountain or in some valley. But Elisha told them not to go. Still they continued to urge him until he said, "Send."

Fifty men were sent out from Jericho to look for Elijah's body. For three days they searched; then they came back to Jericho where Elisha was staying. When they told him they could not find Elijah's body, Elisha said, "Did I not say unto you, Go not?" God had taken care of Elijah by taking him to Heaven in a whirlwind.
